WaterStone Facilitates C.S. Lewis's Enduring Legacy in The Kilns

How WaterStone Can Help With Anonymous Giving

Lewis's home in Oxford, known as "The Kilns," was without question a great source of inspiration for one of the greatest writers, philosophers, and theologians of the 20th century. It was here that Lewis imagined and wrote many of his famous works, including The Chronicles of Narnia, Mere Christianity, The Screwtape Letters, and Surprised by Joy. Even today, in the year that marks the 60th anniversary of Lewis's passing, these works continue to inspire and bring readers of all ages closer to Christ.

But Lewis's legacy remains not only in his published work. The Kilns has become a place of hospitality, study, reflection, and learned conversation between Christian scholars, artists, and laity—and WaterStone is proud to have had a hand in making this happen.

Following Lewis' death, The Kilns fell into a state of disrepair. Fortunately, in 1993, the home came under the control of the C.S. Lewis Foundation, which slowly began efforts to restore the place where Lewis wrote many of his most famous works.

Through the generosity of one of our donors, WaterStone was instrumental in assisting the Foundation to restore and furnish The Kilns. Today, these improvements allow this historical home to function as a conference and Christian study center, where the Foundation offers visitors three ways to experience The Kilns.

Throughout the year, The Kilns is home to a small, intentional Christian community of visiting scholars and advanced graduate students, all engaged in some aspect of research and study at Oxford University.


The C.S. Lewis Study Centre at The Kilns also offers Summer Seminar programs, which it launched in 2001. These seminars host a weekly group of participants, who stay at a nearby bed and breakfast and study each day at The Kilns with a Lewis scholar. They are led in an engaging exploration of the essential themes of Lewis' writings and life, which offers yet another way Lewis's legacy lives on in the next generation.

Finally, while the home is primarily a place of quiet study and hospitality, visitors can usually arrange to explore The Kilns in prescheduled tours. These tours offer visitors a unique, intimate glimpse into the places and scenes that inspired Lewis to write his most beloved books.

This was all made possible, in part, by a generous WaterStone donor who took advantage of anonymous giving through a Giving Fund. This person had a heart for Lewis's work and legacy, but they did not want their identity to be known. Giving via a WaterStone Giving Fund allowed them to keep their identity completely private, and their donation has helped the thousands of Lewis fans and scholars who have benefitted from The Kilns since its re-opening in 2002.

Gifts of Real Estate

hen it comes to real estate, most people only know that selling property exposes the seller to capital gains taxes.

What if we told you there's a way to transfer real estate that bypasses capital gains, generates an immediate charitable deduction, and provides a lifetime income stream? This may sound too good to be true, but it's actually a tool WaterStone uses frequently to serve our donors.

By giving real estate directly to a **WaterStone Charitable Remainder Trust**—instead of selling it first and donating the proceeds—donors can access these unique benefits.

The best part? Our WaterStone advisors will walk you through the entire process from start to finish.

Here's how it works: First, you'll establish a Charitable Remainder Trust (CRT) with yourself or others designated as lifetime income recipients. You can then donate your property to receive an immediate partial tax deduction based on the property's value. Once the property has been sold, you'll receive a lifetime income stream, which as you can see from our case study illustration, could potentially be higher than the income stream the property generated while you owned it. At the end of the term of the trust, the remainder is given to charity.

This giving strategy serves donors by providing simplification, lifetime income, and the opportunity to bypass capital gains—all while fueling charities and their meaningful work.

What Types of Real Estate Can be Given to a Charitable Remainder Trust?

Charitable Remainder Trusts are powerful giving vehicles that we're delighted to offer to our donors.

Virtually any type of property can be given, and you can make an outright or a partial gift:


- Commercial Property
 (Such as office, retail, or income-producing rentals)
- Residential Property (including second homes/ vacation properties)
- Land

Charitable Remainder Trusts are also an effective way to donate gifts of assets beyond real estate—such as agriculture and oil and gas. (Each asset type is unique, however, and comes with its own stipulations. Our team is trained with the knowledge and experience to navigate this complexity, though, so you don't have to.)

Cash is only one of many types of assets you can give through WaterStone. A REAL-LIFE CASE STUDY | Charitable Remainder Trust

This case study centers on a real WaterStone donor, who owned property which they leased to a McDonald's franchise for \$7,600 (or \$91,200 per year). WaterStone's Charitable Remainder Trust (CRT) offered a guaranteed monthly income stream and a simplified retirement process.





- If the donors would have sold the property outright to McDonald's, they would have paid an estimated \$600,000+ in capital gains tax.
- If the donors had kept the property, their heirs would have faced splitting the property (and possibly going through probate).



While the donors owned their property, their financial advisor did not manage the \$2 million McDonald's lease. But now under a CRT, the \$1.8 million trust is added to their financial advisor's assets under advisement.
